Introduction from the editor

In our last edition we showed how we had started to break up the ground in preparation for some autumn seed sowing for our Wildflower Planting project. In between the spells of heavy rain we managed to get some seed sown at the Wigan Road end of the Park. There are some photos on page 2 of the volunteers who came along to hand sow. We are still raising money as this is a three year project and have raised £2000 which is two thirds of our target.

The Friends were pleased to be able to donate to the Park a fully automatic defibrillator, at our monthly Food & Craft Market in September. The defibrillator is located in a secure cabinet on the outside of the Visitor Centre and is accessible to Park users and the local community 24/7 as it is fully registered with the emergency services. It was purchased using funds raised at the Food & Craft markets from donations at the gate. Photos and links to further information is on page 2.

We have raised money that over the years, your committee has voted, to provide funding for anything from bridges to vehicles and recently for a defibrillator. We recently installed a Barn Owl nesting box that would have cost over a £100 to purchase that was made and provided free of charge by a Friend of the Park.

The Friends purchased a fully automated defibrillator for the Park

using money raised from donations made by visitors to the monthly Food and Craft Market. The defibrillator is located on the outside of the Visitor Centre and is accessible to Park users and the local community 24/7. It was installed free of charge by local electricians Elecktec Ltd. We sincerely hope that it will never be needed, but it is reassuring to know that the Park now has one available with the potential to save lives. We were delighted to welcome local hero, Jonny



Mitchell, who represented Team UK in the 2018 Invictus Games in Sydney. Jonny, made the formal presentation of the defibrillator on behalf of the Friends to Conrad Hayton, Chairman of Cuerden Valley Park Trust. The Friends were especially grateful that representatives from Lancashire Fire & Rescue Service (Leyland), Lancashire Constabulary Neighbourhood Policing

Team and two Community
First Aid Responders gave up
their valuable time on that day

to come and support the occasion. They were a huge hit with the crowds, especially with the children, who had lots of fun playing with the fire engine and the Police cars. We really appreciate all the amazing work our emergency services undertake each and every day, to keep us safe, and would like to thank them for everything they do.



Update from our Wildlife Officer, David Beattie

It has been a very mild autumn, at least until the last week in November. Lots of flowers were still in bloom including White Dead Nettle, Herb Robert, Gallant Soldier, Red Campion and Evening Primrose. Berries in the northern areas near the M6 motorway were in profusion with Blackthorn, Hawthorn, Rose Hips and Rowan. I live in hope that the latter will tempt Waxwings to visit. Did you know that "Cuerden" means "dweller by the Rowan tree"? It has been exciting to see some birds by the lake that we don't usually see. Goosanders have I increased over the last five years from about 2 or 3 per day to 15 to 18 each day. The little egret and a tufted duck have also generated lots of Interest.

The highlights for some have been the barn owl that stayed over a fortnight and a tawny owl caught on our trail camera that was being pestered by bats. The best explanation I have for this is that the bats were responding to another bat the owl had caught and was shouting distress calls.

We have also installed a Barn Owl box near the visitor centre and a Tawny Owl box in one of the woodlands. We have an extra Winter Bird Walk on 12 December—see adjacent panel—I am planning our usual Winter Bird Walk in mid-January, so keep watching the Facebook page for information.
